<b>Tenth Grade</b>	<b>Biology Alpha</b> Monday 11:30-2:00 <b>Biology Beta</b> Monday 2:30-5:00	\$1,237	Biology is a thorough course in the life sciences. Study will include all the major facets of living organisms-including cell structure and function; a survey of the major kingdoms of organisms; selected topics in human anatomy; physiology, genetics; and an introduction to major ecological and creation features. All classes are taught from the creation viewpoint. Text is <b><i>Apologia</i></b> , but advanced texts are also used.
	<b>Geometry</b> Thursday 11:00-1:00	\$699 (\$75 book fee)	This course focuses on important geometric facts, proofs using deductive reasoning, the integration of algebra and geometry; and applications of geometry. During the year, the student will learn the properties of parallel lines, circles, and triangle, parallelograms, and other polygons. Throughout the course the student will use skills learned in algebra. <b>Geometry: Concepts</b>
	<b>Algebra 2</b> <b>Session 1</b> Monday 11:30-1:00 <b>Session 2</b> Thursday. 11:15-12:45	\$808 (\$97 book fee)	This class is a continuation of Algebra I. Students will learn to relate and apply algebraic concepts to geometry, statistics, data analysis, and probability. They will connect math to other topics they are studying, like biology, geography, art, and history, through problems rich in algebraic content. <b>A graphing calculator will be required. Algebra 2 , Prentice Hall</b>
	<b>World Literature Alpha</b> Monday 9:45-11:15 <b>World Literature Beta</b> Thursday 1:30-3:00	\$699	Tenth-grade English, a course in world literature, encourages the student to do in-depth analysis of the three major genres of fiction, poetry, and drama. Students gain further experience of the composition formats learned in the ninth grade, and they are introduced to the basic terminology of literary study. Independent, well-organized thought in oral and written work is of great importance. Three or four book reports on outside reading will be expected. Introduction to the SAT will begin at this level. <b>Elements of Literature , BJU</b>
	<b>World History</b> Wednesday 11:30-1:00	\$699	This course begins with a brief overview of history from creation until the 1500's, then continues by taking an in-depth look at the 1500's to the present. The student will be studying events, people and worldviews from a Christian perspective. Each student will be required to keep a notebook on current events in the U.S. and abroad. There will be some reading outside of the textbook and each student will make a detailed timeline of the events covered in class. Weekly assignments will be given which will include textbook or outside reading, biographical research, and map work. Tests will consist of
	<b>Spanish I</b> Thursday 1:30-3:30	\$699	The first year of study presents the beginning student with the basic structure of the Spanish language. Grammar is presented through communication exercises that require active student participation and bring learners to a realistic level of proficiency. Development of listening and speaking skills are emphasized while reading and writing skills are gradually introduced. Spanish culture is introduced through student presentations and projects. This class is suitable for both, students who have never had any Spanish before, and students continuing from Middle school Spanish. <b>Spanish I for Christian</b>
	<b>Spanish 2</b> Thursday 8:30-10:30	\$699	Prerequisite: Spanish 1 - The second year continues to emphasize speaking and listening skills through a variety of instructional techniques and materials, including the text, "hands on" activities, listening comprehension, and reading comprehension exercises, thus enabling the student to speak, read, and write with greater fluency. Students write short compositions in order to develop their writing skills. <b>Spanish II for Christian Schools, Practice Makes Perfect: Spanish Verb Tenses by Dorothy Devney Richmond, Dictionary (Pocket Oxford Spanish Dictionary recommended) Spanish Bible (Santa Biblia Nueva Version Internacional, Zondervan, recommended</b>
	<b>High School Electives</b>	<b>Intro to Technology w/ Typing</b> Wednesday, 1:00-3:00	\$599
<b>Intermediate Technology</b> Wednesday, 3:00-5:00		\$699	This course gives students a thorough understanding of how computers work individually and collectively within a network. Students will explore emerging computing technology and be introduced to a variety of computer applications. Students will gain an in-depth knowledge of Microsoft Office, including MS Access. The text book is loaned to the student for the school year
<b>6<sup>th</sup>-12<sup>th</sup> Music Ensemble</b> Monday, 2:30-4:30		\$545	Theory & performance training for vocalist and instruments that accompany well (call for clarification) . There will be outside performance opportunities.
<b>6<sup>th</sup>-12<sup>th</sup> Speech &amp; Drama</b> Wednesday, 11:00-12:30		\$545	This course will alternate speech assignments with drama work. Students practice speech-making skills such as eye contact, voice projection, and appropriate movement. Brainstorming, teamwork, and teacher advisement will train students to create attention-getting introductions, organize material logically, and connect with the audience. For drama, students learn to develop characters through drama games, improvisational exercises, and skits. The course is designed with both the beginner in mind as well as the students with previous drama exposure. Everyone grows and develops stage skills during the course of the year. While class participation is a large part of the grade, students will be asked to write and practice speeches at home and
<b>Robotics Club Ages 9-14</b> Friday 10:00-12:00		\$200	This club competes in the First Lego League. Students learn how to design and program a robot to perform specific tasks. They also prepare a technical presentation and a group project as part of the competition.
