<b>K – 4th Clubs</b>	<b>Collections with Connection (K-1st)</b> Friday 9:30-11:30	\$425	K-1 <sup>st</sup> Science Club to show the sovereignty of Almighty God as we build collections based on the days of creation. 2-year cycle
	<b>Complexities of Creation (2nd - 4th)</b> Friday 12:00-1:30	\$450	2 <sup>nd</sup> -4 <sup>th</sup> Science class focusing on the different cycles found in the natural world and how they show the God of Creation. 3-year cycle

<b>Sixth Grade</b>	<b>Intro Science Alpha</b> Tuesday 3:00-5:00 <b>Intro Science Beta</b> Wednesday 11:30-1:30	\$1,123	This class focuses on basic science skills and procedures while meeting the necessary standards. Typically for 6 <sup>th</sup> grade but great for any age middle schooler who has little exposure to hands-on science. <b>Custom curriculum (No textbook)</b>
	<b>Intro Math Alpha</b> Tuesday 11:15-1:30 <b>Intro Math Alpha</b> Wednesday 9:00-10:30	\$599 (\$68 book fee)	This is the beginning of a two-course middle school series intended to bridge the gap from elementary mathematics to Algebra 1. The program is designed to motivate your students, enable them to see the usefulness of mathematics in the world around them, enhance their fluency in the language of mathematics and prepare them for success in algebra and geometry. <b>Mathematics Course 1 Text &amp; Workbook (Prentice Hall)</b>
	<b>English</b> Tuesday 11:15-12:45	\$599	Class focuses on basic grammar, writing and basic literature. The class will use a novel each semester to complete an in-depth literature analysis (8-10 weeks per novel). Parents will pick 3 books, at or above grade level for at home reading and book reports. Books reports on novels read outside of class will be presented in “novel” ways throughout the year. <b>Wordly Wise 3000, Book 6 Isha; Wordly Wise Answer Key (Optional); Easy Grammar, Grade 6; Daily Grams, Grade 6, (Optional); The Voyage of the Dawn Treader by CS Lewis, Crispin and the Cross of Lead by Avi, Number the Stars by Lois Lowry</b>
	<b>Geography</b> Tuesday 9:15-10:45	\$599	This course uses Abeka World Geography, Windows on the World, and hands-on projects to look at religions, cultures, and location of countries and regions around the world. The student will be required to complete geographical and political maps from each of the seven continents. Testing focuses on country location. In class, projects include games designed to reinforce locations of countries. Missionary studies use Windows on the World to focus on the needs of people and some studies of actual missionaries, past and present. Making Jesus Lord will be used to prepare students to be missionaries in their own daily life.
	<b>Intro Spanish</b> Tuesday 3:00-4:30	\$599	This course is designed as a beginning level middle school course. Students start from the beginning of the Spanish language and learn how to speak with simple Spanish. By the end of the year, they should be able to write a letter, say Bible verses, and understand basic Spanish. <b>Paso A Paso (A)</b>
	<b>Life Science Alpha</b> Tuesday 8:30-11:00 <b>Life Science Beta</b> Wednesday 3:00-5:30	\$1,123	A strong course covering material from cell structure through kingdoms & phyla. Excellent pre-high school Biology course. All material is taught from a Creation viewpoint. While typically for 7 <sup>th</sup> grades, this class is strongly recommended before advancing to high school biology. <b>Custom Curriculum (no textbook)</b>
<b>Intermediate Math Alpha</b> Tuesday 1:15-2:45 <b>Intermediate Math Beta</b> Wednesday 9:00-10:30	\$599	This is the second part of a two course middle school series intended to bridge the gap from elementary mathematics to Algebra 1. The program is designed to motivate your students, enable them to see the usefulness of mathematics in the world around them, enhance their fluency in the language of mathematics, and prepare them for success in Algebra and Geometry. <b>Mathematics Course 2 (Glencoe)</b>	
<b>English Alpha</b> Tuesday 11:15-12:45 <b>English Beta</b> Wednesday 11:00-12:30	\$599	This class focuses on basic grammar, writing and basic literature. The class will use a novel each semester to complete an in-depth literature analysis (8-10 weeks per novel). Students will also read a biography for a research paper, but this will be discussed 2 <sup>nd</sup> semester. Parents will need to pick 3 books for at home reading and book reports. These books must be books the student has not read before and at or above a 7 <sup>th</sup> grade reading level. Book reports on novels read outside of class will be presented in “novel” ways throughout the year. <b>Georgia History</b> Wednesday 1:15-2:45	\$599	Through hands-on activities this course surveys the history of the state from the Native Americans to the 21st century, and provides information on the government, culture, and people of Georgia. <b>The Story of Georgia,</b>

Eighth Grade	<b>Earth Science Alpha</b> Tuesday 11:30-2:00	\$1,123	Designed to develop critical thinking in science through the study of Earth and Physical Science topics that affect our lives. (Typically for 8 <sup>th</sup> graders) <b>Custom curriculum, (no textbook).</b>
	<b>Earth Science Beta</b> Wednesday 8:30-11:00		
	<b>Algebra 1 - 1<sup>st</sup> year</b> Tuesday 8:30-10:30	\$699 (\$81 book fee)	Part one of a two year journey through Algebra, the course begins with a review of the real numbers and the coordinate plane. Next, the students will investigate equations, inequalities, and proportions in the preparation for a detailed study of graphs and functions. The course will employ concrete examples for the test as well as hands-on exercises with manipulatives to help bridge the gap to key algebraic concepts. This will prepare the student well for the second year of deeper study. <b>Algebra I, Prentice Hall</b>
	<b>English Alpha</b> Tuesday 2:45-4:15	\$599	This class focuses on some grammar but mostly writing and basic literature. The class will use short stories, poetry, and novels to complete in-depth literature analysis. Three or four book reports on novels read outside of class will be expected during the year. Writing will focus on expository, persuasive, descriptive, and journal. Writing newspaper articles for the Living Science newsletter will be completed in class. <b>Excursions in Literature, 2<sup>nd</sup> ed. – BJU; Wordly Wise Book 8; Wordly Wise Answer Key (Optional); The Hobbit by JRR Tolkien; The Giver by Lois Lowry; Animal Farm by George Orwell</b>
	<b>World History</b> Wednesday 11:00-12:30	\$699	This course will begin with a brief overview of history from creation until the 1500's, then continues for the rest of the year by taking an in-depth look at the 1500's to the present. The student will be studying events, people and worldviews from a Christian perspective. Each student will be required to keep a notebook on current events in the U.S. and abroad. There will be some reading outside of the textbook and each student will make a detailed timeline of the events covered in class. Weekly assignments will be given which will include textbook or outside reading, biographical research, and map work. Tests will consist of multiple choice, matching, and essay questions.
	<b>Georgia History</b> Wednesday 1:15-2:45	\$599	Through hands-on activities this course surveys the history of the state from the Native Americans to the 21st century, and provides information on the government, culture, and people of Georgia. <b>The Story of Georgia, Notgrass</b>
	<b>Intro Spanish</b> Tuesday 3:00-4:30	\$599	This course is designed as a beginning level middle school course. Students start from the beginning of the Spanish language and learn how to speak with simple Spanish. By the end of the year, they should be able to write a letter, say Bible verses, and understand basic Spanish. <b>Paso A Paso (A)</b>
<b>Intermediate Spanish</b> Wednesday 3:00-4:30	\$599 (\$55 book fee)	This course is the continuation of Intro Spanish (SPA006) for middle school students. The students will learn more in depth grammar and vocabulary. They should be able to create skits in Spanish and carry on a more advanced conversation at the end of this class. <b>Paso a Paso - B</b>	
Middle School Electives	<b>Intro to Technology w/ Typing</b> Wednesday, 1:00-3:00	\$599	This course gives students a thorough understanding of how computers work individually and collectively within a network. Students will explore emerging computing technology and be introduced to a variety of computer applications. The text book is loaned to the student for the school year.
	<b>6<sup>th</sup>-12<sup>th</sup> Music Ensemble</b> Monday, 2:30-4:30	\$545	Theory & performance training for vocalist and instruments that accompany well (call for clarification) . There will be outside performance opportunities.
	<b>6<sup>th</sup>-12<sup>th</sup> Speech &amp; Drama</b> Wednesday, 11:00-12:30	\$545	This course will alternate speech assignments with drama work. Students practice speech-making skills such as eye contact, voice projection, and appropriate movement. Brainstorming, teamwork, and teacher advisement will train students to create attention-getting introductions, organize material logically, and connect with the audience. For drama, students learn to develop characters through drama games, improvisational exercises, and skits. The course is designed with both the beginner in mind as well as the students with previous drama exposure. Everyone grows and develops stage skills during the course of the year. While class participation is a large part of the grade, students will be asked to write and practice speeches at home and memorize lines
	<b>Robotics Club Ages 9-14</b> Friday 10:00-12:00	\$200	This club competes in the First Lego League. Students learn how to design and program a robot to perform specific tasks. They also prepare a technical presentation and a group project as part of the competition.
